What is baptism?

First, it must be understood that baptism is an outward proclamation of an inward conversion. In other words, baptism is a ceremonial act undertaken <u>after a person accepts Jesus Christ</u> as his or her Lord and Savior. This is usually done in the presence of the church body as a public proclamation of one's faith.

Peter said to them, "Repent, and each of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. Acts 2:38 (NASB)

"For whoever is ashamed of Me and My words, the Son of Man will be ashamed of him when He comes in His glory, and the glory of the Father and of the holy angels. Luke 9:26 (NASB)

Corresponding to that, baptism now saves you—not the removal of dirt from the flesh, but an appeal to God for a good conscience through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, 1 Peter 3:21 (NASB)

having been buried with Him in baptism, in which you were also raised up with Him through faith in the working of God, who raised Him from the dead. Colossians 2:12 (NASB)

Why should I get baptized?

- Baptism is demonstrating repentance of your sins
- Baptism is part of The Great Commission
- He that believes and is baptized shall be saved

Mark 16:16 (NASB)

"He who has believed and has been baptized shall be saved; but he who has disbelieved shall be condemned.

• Baptism is how we connect to Jesus death.

• Baptism is the burial of our old life.

Therefore if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come.
